

Humber-talking has set our priorities, this month we are to:

- 1. Reduce ASB improve the quality of life
- 2. Dwelling Burglaries
- 3. Rural Crime

Here is an overview of the crimes reported during September 2023 across both Ward areas:

Residential Burglary reports (eight reports made across both Wards during September)

8/9/23 – Norwood, shed burglary to property whereby suspect is disturbed but not before stealing a high value mountain bike.

9/9/23 – Spindle Garth, Hanoi Burglary whereby suspects have entered through unlocked patio doors and conduct untidy search before locating car keys and stealing victim's vehicle in the process. Two adult males have been arrested and enquiries are underway.

10/9/23 – Voase Way, entry gained to shed, and 2 high value mountain bikes stolen from within.

17/9/23 – Coombs Yard, entry gained to premises and cement mixer stolen in the process.

18/9/23 – Thompson Avenue, entry gained to lean to shed, and motorcycle stolen from within and later recovered, enquiries ongoing.

18/9/23 – Hodgson Avenue, entry gained to garage causing damage in the process, enquiries ongoing.

22/9/23 – Hull Road, entry gained to outbuilding and high value bicycle stolen from within, enquiries ongoing.

25/9/23 – Seaborough House, unknown persons have smashed a window at the rear of the property and have taken car keys belonging to a BMW 1 series which has been taken and later discovered crashed outside a nearby property. Two persons are later arrested for the offence and enquiries continue.

Business Burglary reports (six reports made across both Wards last month)

1/9/23 – Long Lane, attempt entry gained to a secure building site and are found by police attempting to steal machinery. Arrests made and enquiries continue.

6/9/23 – Coupland's, Toll Gavel, business burglary to store overnight via the front locked door, enquiries ongoing.

28/9/23 – Norwood, suspects have smashed front window of shop to gain entry and have stolen two high end bicycles from within.

28/9/23 – ST Mary's Court, Commercial burglary after informant's alarm has activated, informant attends premises to discover the right-side window smashed and several attempts to smash the middle window were also made. Entry has been made via the smashed window

and designer handbags have been stolen from the business.

28/9/23 – Norwood, suspects have smashed front window of shop to gain entry and steal two high end bicycles from within, enquiries underway.

29/9/23 – Millets, Butcher Row, two unknown males smash the front of the door to business and steal an unknown amount of clothing.

Theft (over eighteen reports across both Wards last month)

1/9/23 – Warton Avenue, theft of vehicle, after been awoken to the sound of car engine starting before hearing car drive off by sound of tyres on gravel drive. No entry gained to property, so vehicle has been stolen by keyless entry. Vehicle is later abandoned with damage.

- 11/9/23 Marks & Spencer, shop theft, named suspect.
- 12/9/23 Morrisons, theft from vehicle
- 12/9/23 Boyes, Wednesday Market, shop theft x 2
- 15/9/23 Wickes, theft of bolt cutters
- 15/9/23 Swinemoor Industrial Estate, shop theft
- 15/9/23 Beverley Railway Station, theft of pedal cycle
- 20/9/23 Park Grange Farm, theft of fence post

20/9/23 – Silver Birch Close, theft of pedal cycle

22/9/23 – Millets, Lairgate, shop theft, suspect known and arrested with enquiries ongoing.

22/9/23 – Tesco, Morton Lane, shop theft x 2

23/9/23 – Dunelm, Flemingate, shop theft

24/9/23 – Claremont House, theft of vehicle after suspect was stopped by police and vehicle was confirmed as stolen resulting in arrest made and subsequent charges being brought to suspect as a result.

Damage (nine reports made across Minster & Woodmansey Ward last month)

1/9/23 – Rosedale Walk, damage caused to vehicle, damaged windscreen.

2/9/23 – The Cornish Bakery, Toll Gavel, damage caused to building.

6/9/23 – Grovehill Road, damage caused to property, youth related.

11/9/23 – Crathorne Road, damage caused to property.

12/9/23 – Wilberforce Crescent, damage caused to window of property.

18/9/23 – Trinity Court, damage caused to garden furniture.

21/9/23 – Long Lane, Woodmansey, damage caused to house sign.

22/9/23 – Kindred Spirits, Toll Gavel, damage caused to window.

24/9/23 – Railway Street, ground floor window has been smashed by a person potentially putting their fist/hand through it.

Drugs (just one report made across Minster & Woodmansey Ward last month)

30/9/23 – Wilberforce Crescent, whilst searching a property, a small plastic bag containing white powder was located. Adult female interviewed and enquiries continue.

Other crimes reported include public order, harassment, and assault type incidents some of which were domestic related.

Two arrested following burglary

Two teenage boys were arrested following a burglary at an address on St Giles Croft in Beverley earlier last week.

On Monday 25 September it was reported that somebody forced entry to the property and stole keys before using them to take a car from outside.

The car was then reportedly driven erratically through Beverley before being involved in a collision on Lockwood Road. The people in the vehicle reportedly fled the scene on foot.

An investigation was launched, and two boys were arrested on suspicion of burglary, both have been bailed whilst our enquiries continue.

2. Community Priorities for October 2023

Humbertalking has set our priorities, this month we are to:

1. Reduce ASB – improve the quality of life in the community!

Action – Humberside Police's Halloween campaign aimed at helping combat burglary offences, help reduce incidents of Anti-Social behaviour and to provide advice and support to the local communities.

Officers from neighbourhood policing teams will be going out and speaking to schools across the force about anti-social behaviour and encouraging youngsters to enjoy the festivities without becoming a nuisance in their neighbourhood.

Retailers are reminded of their responsibility not to sell flour and eggs to youngsters on the run up to Halloween and Mischief Night. Posters available from My Community Alert.

2. Preventing Residential dwelling Burglaries



Is anybody home?

- Lights You can get plug-in timers for your lamps and timers for your ceiling lights. Don't just light up the hall. Fool a burglar by lighting up the landing, bathroom, bedroom and living room too. Really fox him by varying the times each light comes on.
- Sound advice Use a plug-in timer for a radio make it a talk station rather than music.
- Windows Remember to shut all windows, even small and upstairs ones, when you leave the house, in your garden or in the rear of your property. If you're upstairs, close your downstairs windows and if you're planning some time away, get a trusted neighbour to shut the curtains at night. You could return the favour some time!

3. Tackling Rural Crime:

Rural Crime is not limited to the farmyard. Serious and organised crime groups are often linked to rural and wildlife crime particularly in relation to theft of agricultural machinery and poaching like hare coursing.

Our patrols are reminding farmers to review their security and to keep their properties/equipment safe.

As the sweet smell of candy floss fills the air and flashing lights brighten the night sky, this Friday (6th October) we welcome the annual return of Hull Fair.

We will be out and about every day and night throughout the event, supporting Hull City Council, so that you can enjoy your time at the fair.

Ahead of the fair, here are some tips and advice to help you stay safe:

- Leave any valuables such as tablets, jewellery, and credit cards at home. Only take with you what you absolutely need and remember to lock all windows and doors before you leave your home and car.
- Consider using one of the park and ride services if possible.
- If you are driving, park in a well-lit, busy area and agree on a pre-arranged meeting place should you become separated from friends or family.
- Consider wearing clothes that have pockets with zips to keep your money and mobile phones secure.
- If you are taking small children to the fair, take a photo of them beforehand so we can see exactly what they are wearing should they go missing.
- Write your contact details on a piece of paper and put it in the pocket of the children that you are taking so we can get in touch if we find them!
- Just in case you need them, make sure you are familiar with the location of first aid, the police, and the lost/found children offices.

If you see anything suspicious, immediately report it to a police officer, PCSO, steward or fairground staff.
