Humber-talking has set our priorities, this month we are to:

- **1.** Reduce ASB improve the quality of life.
- 2. Dwelling Burglaries
- 3. Rural Crime

Here is an overview of the crimes reported during October 2023 across both Ward areas:

Residential Burglary reports (several reports made last month)

4/10/23 – Priory Road, whilst victim asleep in bed suspect attempts to gain en2try via the patio door, suspect gains entry by opening the bathroom and front window, nothing stolen, and no obvious signs of damage caused.

4/10/23 – The Cloisters, entry gained to outbuilding and mobility scooter stolen from within 6/10/23 – Canterbury Close, entry gained to shed, and mountain bike stolen from within 21/10/23 – Residential burglary to property stealing personal items from within.

22/10/23 – Cherry Tree Lane, Residential Burglary to property after suspect enters the house through an unlocked door and steal Xbox and 2 x Iphones. Suspect known and arrested for the offence, enquiries still ongoing.

29/10/23 – Wilbert Court, youth related burglary after 6 youths are seen on CCTV, some on foot and some on cycles, one male is seen to pull the door off a garage and a pedal cycle is taken from within, enquiries ongoing.

31/10/23 – Long Lane, entry gained to a brick detached shed at the side of victim's property and 2 bicycles stolen from within

Business Burglary reports (just three reports made last month)

9/10/23 – Beverley Grammar School, an unknown male around 30-40 has been present in the school grounds without permission. He was seen to elbow a window on the main building and

then walk around the building attempting to gain entry via a side door. He is unsuccessful and upon walking past the same window he elbows it again causing damage to the window. 26/10/23 – Linden Homes, attempt commercial burglary to business damaging garage door in the process.

28/10/23 – Butcher Row, unknown persons have approached locked and secure business premises from the rear and place ladders against the side of the building and remove tiles from the roof before breaking internal roof and entering premises. Person is then seen to enter shop floor area with a large bag and remove jewellery from cabinet then makes good their escape via hole in the roof. Enquiries underway

- 19/10/23 Co-op, Lincoln Way, shop theft
- 20/10/23 Boyes, shop theft x 3, enquiries ongoing
- 20/10/23 Tesco, shop theft x 6, suspect named for one.
- 21/10/23 Morrisons, shop theft
- 25/10/23 Sewell Service Station, shop theft

Damage (just seven reports made last month)

- 26/10/23 Mintfield Road, domestic related damage caused to vehicle bonnet.
- 26/10/23 Mintfield Road, damage caused to vehicle brick thrown at the windscreen.
- 28/10/23 Grovehill Road, damage caused to living room window.
- 30/10/23 Flemingate, damage caused to vehicle eggs thrown by youths, enquiries ongoing.

Other crimes reported include public order, harassment, and assault type incidents some of which were domestic related.

2. Community Priorities for November 2023

Humbertalking has set our priorities, this month we are to:

1. Reduce ASB – Improve the quality of life in the community!

Action - Humberside Police's Halloween & Bonfire campaign aimed at helping to combat burglary offences, help reduce incidents of Anti-Social Behaviour and to provide advice and support to the local communities.

UPDATE: Officers from neighbourhood policing teams have been out in schools across the force talking about anti-social behaviour and encouraging youngsters to enjoy the festivities without becoming a nuisance in their neighbourhood.

Retailers are reminded of their responsibility not to sell flour and eggs to youngsters on the run up to Bonfire Night. Posters available from My Community Alert





Whenever possible, wheelie bins should be stored securely behind locked gates Do not overfill your wheelie bins or leave lo rubbish around them



Attending an organised event with a professional firework display is safer and more spectacular, but we wish to make the public aware of the dangers of building their own bonfires.

Bonfire Night should not be viewed as a chance to burn waste or household rubbish. They should be recycled or disposed of using the household collection service or at one of the waste and recycling centres across the region.

Patrols will be working alongside Humberside Fire to identify illegal bonfires being built in the run up to Bonfire Night itself.

2. Preventing Residential dwelling Burglaries

As the nights get darker and longer, it is usual for us to see crimes such as burglary and theft rise, particularly if houses and vehicles are unattended whilst you are gathering at firework displays.

Burglars are often opportunistic thieves who prey on houses, garages, sheds and outbuildings. They seek out any opening that they can take advantage of, specifically doors and windows that are left open or unlocked or are easy to force.

3. Tackling Rural Crime:

A rural crime is a crime that takes place in a rural location and includes:

- Farm/agricultural related crime: theft of/or damage to plant vehicles, equipment or livestock
- Wildlife environmental related crime: animal cruelty, poaching, badger baiting, killing or taking of wild birds or damage of protected habitats.
- Heritage related crime: theft/damage or removal of articles from historic sites.
- **Rural related crime**: day-to-day community criminality, including violence, damage and theft.

Rural locations are defined by using the DEFRA/Office of National Statistics output areas.

If you require advice or guidance in relation to possible wildlife incidents, please contact your local Wildlife Crime trained officer.

If you do see anything suspicious, please report it.

999 if there is a crime in progress or 101 for non-emergency incidents.


