NEW: New Cycle for Christmas, Follow our security tips



Humber-talking has set our priorities, this month we are to:

- 1. Prevent Residential dwelling Burglaries & vehicle crime
- 2. Reduce ASB improve the quality of life.
- 3. Tackle Rural Crime

Here's a summary of just some of the crimes that have been reported across Beverley Rural last month:

Residential Burglary reports – (one investigation)

20/12/23 – Residential Burglary, North Newbald, victim's shed has been broken into whilst property unoccupied and stolen motorbike leathers, helmet, and boxes.

Business burglary reports – (one investigation)

21/12/23 – Business Burglary, Weel Road, three persons approach locked and secure business unit and using a rock and hammer smash the glass panel of double-glazed door to gain entry, stealing keys to a Land rover before making off with vehicle which was parked outside. Juvenile male arrested and charged for the offence.

Thefts – (one investigation)

10/12/23 – Theft, Bishop Burton, unknown suspects approach victim's property and walk up the side of the property and open the meter cupboard on the side of the house, turning the gas off and stealing the gas meter from the wall.



Criminal Damage – (one investigation)

3/12/23 – Criminal Damage, Cherry Burton, suspect vehicle has been driven onto farmland through a gap in the hedgerow and has then completed multiple donuts in the snow which has caused approximately £1000 in lost crops.

Drugs – (no investigations)

Other (over 13 other investigations) These include malicious communications, harassment, public order, assault and drunk and disorderly to name just a few.

Humber-talking has set our priorities, this month we are to:

1. Preventing Residential dwelling Burglaries & vehicle crime

During winter months, it is usual for us to see crimes such as burglary and theft rise, particularly if houses and vehicles are unattended.

Burglars are often opportunistic thieves who prey on houses, garages, sheds, and outbuildings. They seek out any opening that they can take advantage of, specifically doors and windows that are left open or unlocked or are easy to force.

Action

During the autumn and winter months, our Policing Teams will continue be out and about providing residents with advice on home security.

2. Reduce ASB - Improve the quality of life in the community



This period is always one of our busiest, you will see a clear police presence on patrol in and around your neighbourhood over this period.

Action

The Beverley Rural Neighbourhood Policing Teams work with our key partners and the community to reduce anti-social behaviour and the anti-social use of motor vehicles. We provide proactive responses to reports of anti-social behaviour in our neighbourhood Area and are constantly reviewing our patrol strategy to address this. We are working hard with partners to address this and ensure our market towns and rural communities are a safe place to live and work.

3. Tackling Rural Crime:

Rural crime is not limited to the farmyard. Serious and organised crime groups are often linked to rural and wildlife crime particularly in relation to theft of agricultural machinery and poaching like hare coursing. Our patrols are reminding farmers to review their security and to keep their properties/equipment safe. In relation to the security of Tractor GPS Receiver and Screens, please visit the Police website for crime prevention advice around MARK IT, REMOVE IT and LOCK IT.

ACTION: Operation GALILEO has restarted for the season. Throughout this year we have worked with volunteers on the Rural Watches across the whole of the East Riding to deter rural criminality. In addition, we will utilise all the available technology, crime prevention techniques and assistance from the Rural Crime Team to deter and detect crime.

Your local Neighbourhood Policing Team appreciates the importance of being in the right place, at the right time, for the right reasons to reassure the public, improve public confidence and reduce crime and anti-social behaviour in the area in which we all live and work.

Prevention of Crime advice

If you got or gifted a bike this Christmas, please keep them safe and secure.

Register bikes, new and old, on Bike Register: https://www.bikeregister.com or Immobilise: www.immobilise.com. We also want people to consider some crime prevention advice:

Lots of cycle thefts are committed by opportunist thieves who see unlocked and unattended cycles as a good target to steal.

There are also thieves who target high value cycles using social media to identify possible cycles to steal. To tackle this and minimise the risk these offenders pose, people shouldn't share too many details about their bikes on social media. Also, if you are looking to buy a bike, make sure you are buying from a reputable source.

There are simple steps you can take to ensure that you don't make your bike a target:

Always lock you bike when you leave it.

Keep bikes always locked, when not in use, in a secure building.

Here storing your bikes in a shed or garage, secure sheds them with a strong D lock to an anchor point and consider fitting an alarm.

36 Remove cycle carriers from your car when they're not in use.

Think twice about posting your ride stat results or pictures of your bike on social media sites, especially if your home address can also be viewed. If you use them then check your security settings and set at least a 1000m exclusion zone around your house.



By taking small steps in improving security the public can help prevent and deter thieves.

Make cycle security and registration of your bike a New Year's resolution.
